Retiring collections

The retiring collection at our December concert raised £530 for the Helen Foundation. Roger and Annie Kirk write:

In 2022, The Helen Foundation benefited over 2,000 young people across Teignbridge, through school-based arts workshops, individual bursaries and special arts projects. This donation will help the Foundation to maintain its encouragement of young people to experience the excitement and challenges of the arts.

And in May **£521** was raised for Devon Air Ambulance:

This very generous donation will ensure our crew can continue to respond to the people of Devon in their time of need. In 2022 we were tasked to 1,828 missions. In May alone the helicopters were dispatched 124 times and the critical care cars 65 times. Without your generosity we would not have been able to provide this help to people in time-critical emergencies.

From the Musical Director

Well, what a year that was! I cannot believe how quickly the weeks fly by at our Thursday night rehearsals. I feel that the choir has grown in confidence and vocal agility and it has been a real pleasure being on that musical journey with you. I hope you get as big a buzz out of Thursday nights at St Peter's as I do.

Our rehearsals would not be the same without the support of Anna, our wonderful accompanist whose eye for detail and dedication to ensuring that all the right notes are sung in the right order is second to none. Thank you, Anna – we could not do it without you.

The first half of the Christmas concert was filled with the choral suite *From the Bavarian Highlands* by Elgar, a real Edwardian classic. Although some of the lyrics were a little on the syrupy side, we sang the more reflective movements with great feeling and the final chorus was an energetic gallop to the end.

The concert was enhanced by the superlative accompaniment of Andrew Millington on piano and organ, and he treated us to two solos that certainly showed off the wide range of stops on the St Peter's organ.

The choir enjoyed the challenge of two contemporary works by Eric Whitacre and Ola Gjeilo, both of which were well received alongside the more traditional seasonal offerings in the second half of the concert. I think that we were all relieved not to have to wear extra layers and blankets this year with the church heating up and running!

January saw us commence rehearsals for *Messiah*. Having listened to various interpretations of this choral classic I did have an idea of what the Shaldon *Messiah* should sound like, and I think it is fair to say that what you produced for the concert in May was the musical highlight of my year. Phrasing, articulation, dynamics and diction were all rehearsed and taken on board.

Our soloists for the concert were all old friends until sadly James had to drop out due to getting a contract with Royal Opera (fair enough!). Tim Mirfin proved to be an exceptional bass soloist who wowed us with his power and resonance.

The performance was supported by Anna and the wonderful Shaldon Sinfonietta, whose orchestral playing was superb and certainly inspired the choir to even greater things on the day.

The combination of choir, orchestra and soloists came together in a truly magical performance and one that we will all remember for years to come.

Thank you all for your commitment, energy, enthusiasm and good humour at rehearsals. I am looking forward to the new season already!
